From the President



Dear Friends of Bellin College,

It was a busy spring semester at Bellin College. The college is strategically working to reach new heights with our programs and services to students. Graduation was May 18, 2019, at the Weidner Center on the UW-Green Bay campus,

and 107 students achieved their degrees. It was a special ceremony as we had our first class of Bachelor of Science in Diagnostic Medical Sonography graduates. There were seven in this first class and all are exceptional. We are proud of their achievements as well as with all of our graduates. They have worked hard and accomplished their dream!

I am very excited to share with you some new and exciting news about the college. This spring we began the Orthopaedic Manual Physical Therapy (OMPT) Fellowship program. This unique opportunity provides therapists the highest level of skill in the integration of advanced manual physical therapy techniques as well as clinical research and becoming leaders in the field. We also launched our first terminal degree, Doctor of Science in Physical Therapy (DScPT). This program will enable physical therapists to become leaders in the area of teaching as well as participants and contributors to clinical research. We are excited about these two new opportunities.

In the fall, we will be offering a Diagnostic Cardiac Sonography (DCS) Certificate program that is designed for the working sonographer to gain certification in adult echocardiography. The courses are offered online with an onsite weekend intensive at the college. This is an excellent opportunity for sonographers to gain knowledge that is in high demand.

The Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE) visited the college to review our nursing programs for accreditation. This past fall, we were notified

that we received a 10-year accreditation for our nursing programs. This is great accomplishment and I am very proud of the work the nursing team continues to do for our program.

Bellin College is now offering all of the general education courses our students need to complete their degree. This is exciting as we can focus courses to areas of interest in the health sciences. Our science lab supports their biology, microbiology, anatomy and physiology courses. The Student Success Center has had an outstanding first year. We had over 1,000 visits in the fall and the same in the spring. Students received help with tutoring, writing and course-specific support. Seminars were offered on resume writing, note-taking and test-taking strategies. Proceeds from our golf outing on June 17, 2019, will help us continue to create an even more student-centered space.

As you review this issue of Bellin Forward, I believe that we are blessed with a sense of commitment from our faculty, staff, students and donors. The dedication of each of these groups has helped make these accomplishments a reality. We are committed to creating the very best teaching and learning environments for our students as they are the future. They will be the ones at the bedside, in the clinics, in the exams and testing suites, providing us with the outstanding care we expect and you can proudly say you supported a Bellin College graduate.

First graduates in Diagnostic Medical Sonog

he first Bachelor of Science in Diagnostic Medical Sonography students walked through the Bellin College doors in 2016. On May 18, 2019, they crossed the Weidner Center stage as the first seven graduates of the program led by Amanda Hogan, diagnostic medical sonography program director and instructor.

Hogan wasn't prepared for how she'd feel about teaching students, having been a working sonographer before coming into her role at Bellin College. Hogan and colleague Stacey May have taught these students since they were freshman and have grown to look at them almost as their own children, Hogan said.

"I'm always thinking about them when they're doing their first rotation in a new hospital. I think I'm probably just as nervous when they take their boards as they are," she said. "I'm sad to see them go, but I know they're going to do good things."

Students weren't so sure what to expect from the program either.

"We had no idea what to anticipate for the program, but I believe that all of our expectations were blown out of the water," 2019 graduate Ivy Williams said. "Bellin College welcomed us with open arms and taught us how to be the best

healthcare professionals we can be."
"I personlly did not think the
ultrasound program would be as challenging as it was. That being said, both
professors really push you to make you
the best sonogragpher and will take
time out of their schedule if you need
any help," said graduate Josh Salm.

Making the switch from the hospital to the classroom was a bit of a shift for Hogan.

"I miss my patients, but it's a whole different level of care," she said.
"Instead of helping your patients, you really get to see your students grow.
The rewards of teaching are just different. I'm not finding patient

pathology anymore, but I get to see my students grow and become better. I always used to tell them that my success for them is that if I walk into an ultrasound room and I see that they're going to scan me, I'll be happy. I can say that to all (the graduates)."

The class of 2019 graduates are CassieMae Anderson, Nicole Erdmann, Ellen Noldin, Natalie Reinhard, Josh Salm, Shannon Thoma and Ivy Williams.

All seven of the graduates passed their physics, abdomen, vascular and OB/GYN exams through the American Registry of Diagnostic Medical Sonography on their first

Continuing a legacy

Siblings carry on Bellin College tradition

A long-standing tradition at Bellin College has been members from the same family attending the school. Whether it's generational with students atending the same school as a parent or grandparent, or siblings attending together or right after each other, there are many instances of this throughout the years. This spring, Bellin College was home to several sets of siblings. These pairs of siblings have come forward to share their story. They all come from various backgrounds, but all have one thing in common — the desire to help people.

Nellie and Max Soda

Nellie and Max Soda are originally from Princeton, Wisconsin, in Green Lake County. Growing up on a farm with a family of six, their mother's background as a nurse had an influence on her children.

Nellie Soda found the sonography field with a little help from older brother Max. It was a high school sports injury Max received that sparked an interest in that type of healthcare for Nellie.

Max was a sophomore in high school when he needed an ultrasound on his kidney after coming down on another player's knee wrong at football practice. Seeing the technology during the ultrasound was intriguing to Nellie, who was a sixth-grader at the time.

"I always wanted to be in healthcare, but I didn't know which one to do," she said. "So I liked the technology of sonography because I didn't really want to do nursing. I'd heard enough war stories from mom, so I didn't want to

do that part. I wanted to do something a little bit different that would still be useful."

Their mom being an OB nurse at ThedaCare Medical Center-Berlin was a factor in Max's choice to join the 15-month nursing program. He came to the college in January and will be graduating in October 2020. Max began his healthcare pursuits at University of Wisconsin-La Crosse with a degree in biology before following in his sister's footsteps and coming to Bellin College.

"Based on the prior education that I

had to build off of, the accelerated program seemed like the best route, because you can get in and get out, start making money and get on with life," he said. "But also that it's in-person unlike other accelerated programs. I learn better in person versus an online program."

While in different programs and different career paths, they still find time to get together as part of a family; church and Sam's Club being favorite outings. Currently, three Soda siblings are in the Green Bay area. Another brother is studying at UW-Green Bay.

somewhat up in the air. Max thinks he'd enjoy working in an operating room or an emergency room or doing wound care and maybe eventually becoming a traveling nurse. Nellie is still waiting to find out what parts of sonography she enjoys most or even possibly obtaining more education in the future. Depending on the circumstances she'd like to move back home to the Princeton area.

Erin and Shannon McCauley

Sisters Erin and Shannon McCauley both graduated in May 2019, from the nursing program, however they didn't come in on the same path. They both found themselves at UW-La Crosse before coming into Bellin College. Erin came to the college as a junior transfer student and Shannon as a 15-month student.

Being in school together wasn't new for the sisters, since they overlapped about two years while at UWL, however they haven't lived together since they were in high school. While at Bellin College they only had maternity class together. "It's been really nice because we've had overlap with all of our classes, so studying together and learning from each other," Erin said.

Shannon echoed those thoughts. "Since she's in the JTO option she's taken the classes before me, so if I have questions she's really good at helping me or clarifying certain disease processes," she said. "So she helps me a lot if I'm unsure of information, so that's been nice."

Both sisters knew they wanted to be in healthcare in some capacity, but were unsure in which direction they would go.

"Seeing our family and friends and their interactions with the nurses just cemented the fact that I should be a nurse," Erin said.

Shannon has always been interested in healthcare and nursing. She says the catalyst was watching a friend's family member going through heart failure and seeing how the nurses handled the family. Observing how nurses explained the information to them in terms they could understand really solidified her decision to go into nursing.

"I knew I wanted to be in healthcare," Shannon said. "I didn't know exactly in what way. I thought maybe radiation therapy originally, and then I shadowed and was like 'nope, I want more hands-on care.' And just from talking to family members and seeing how much of an impact nurses have, I just knew that was probably where I was headed."

As for the future, Erin recently accepted a job on the Neuro Floor at Meriter Hospital in Madison. She eventually would like to continue her education with EMT courses and more.

Shannon recently accepted a job at Aurora St. Luke's Medical Center in Milwaukee on a Medical Surgical Telemetry Unit, but ultimately her goal is to "be someone that helps

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people in a time of need and provides that relief and comfort when they're going through a terrible time, and who people respect and can go to if they're having questions or concerns."

Brayden and Brock Maroszek

Brayden and Brock Maroszek of Suamico were both in the BSN traditional program this spring. Being in the same track but on a two-year delay, Brayden graduated in May 2019 while Brock is class of 2021, has helped them continue the bond they forged while growing up.

"I really enjoy seeing him around and it is fun to see him improve. We also are able to help one another like a tutor would," Brayden said.

Brayden always knew he wanted to go into the medical field.

"When I was in eighth grade I was diagnosed with epilepsy and in the following year had to have brain surgery," he said. "As a result I spent a lot of time at Froedtert Hospital and got to see what nurses did. I also wanted to give back after everything other people did for me."

Brock had a little hesitation when he decided to join the nursing field because he is male, but he now says "it's where I should be." One way he looks to make a difference could be by working with male patients. On one of his first clinical experiences he was able to bring an older male patient out of his shell a little bit and was able to connect with him about sports.

"I went in there and started talking to him and you could tell he didn't want to engage with other people," he

said. "So basically I went out of my way and I saw on his board he had all football and sports stuff. So I asked him about the Badgers game and he just got a big smile on his face, like nobody had talked to him about that before. That was one of my really good moments in clinical."

Adrenaline and excitement also attracted Brock to healthcare.

"I always wanted to do something kind of exciting and where I wouldn't regret all the work I did," Brock said. "Where I don't sit in an office every day."

Aside from the classroom, Brayden found hands-on training most useful.

"My favorite memories from Bellin College are spending time with my classmates and the disaster simulations," Brayden said. "I really enjoyed being both the patient and the nurse. I feel those sims were great training for both people involved in the situation such as active shooters and how to operate in a hospital when there are large amounts of patients arriving."

Brayden graduated from Bellin College on May 18, 2019. His future goals include working at Aspirus Wausau Hospital and, down the line, getting his master's degree and becoming a nurse practitioner.

Brock's biggest dream is to be a nurse on a flight team or to one day work in Hawaii. Beyond that, becoming a nurse practitioner, nurse educator or nurse anesthetist are also on his radar.

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Student Profile / Kayla Bauer, class of 2020

When BSN 2020 traditional student Kayla Bauer of Arlington, Wisconsin, began classes at Bellin College she described herself as "timid, shy, did not participate much in class, and just wasn't sure about anything," but with some clinical practice and guidance from her professors, she has grown into a more confident and self-assured student.

Kayla decided to pursue healthcare after the loss of one of her closest family members. Growing up, her cousin Mark was someone she always looked up to. He was the star athlete and an honors student. Mark had decided to begin his career as a firefighter/EMT.

"He was a very smart kid, never got into trouble, but he made one bad decision and it ended up costing him his future and his life," she said. "I would have never guessed that my cousin was using one of the most dangerous drugs in our country. He would end up losing his life due to a stupid decision and pressure from his teammates to just try heroin."

After he graduated, he planned to go to medical school to become an ER doctor, but passed before that dream could become reality, so Kayla took matters into her own hands.

"Mark's death is what really pushed me to pursue a career in healthcare, so I can help those when they need someone the most," she said. "After his death, I found myself wanting to pursue a career in the emergency services, and today I can proudly call myself a firefighter/AEMT."

However, Kayla doesn't want to stop at being an EMT. When beginning her time in emergency services, she learned she wanted to continue to care for patients and get them back to their lives.

"Being in EMS, we only have our patients for a short time, drop them off at the hospital and then many times we never hear how things ended up," she said. "Knowing that following my patients' progress and being more involved with their care was something I wanted, I decided to go down the nursing path, and I am so glad that I did. It has been the best decision I have made, and I cannot wait to finish up with my degree next May."



As Kayla finishes her third year, Assistant Professor of Nursing Sherri Hanrahan has stood out as a big influence on her education so far.

"This past fall, Sherri was my faculty for my first clinical in the hospital. I again was pretty timid and shy at the beginning of clinical, but as the semester went on, I became very comfortable caring for multiple patients, talking to other healthcare providers, and just applying my knowledge to my patients changing condition. She challenged me a lot during that clinical. I have learned so much about myself both personally and professionally, and without her guidance, I would not be near the person I am today."

With a year left, she still isn't sure where she will end up. After being an EMT, she is considering the emergency room and maybe moving into the role of a flight nurse. However, she loved working with children and especially infants, so the NICU might be where she belongs. She plans to apply to the ER and the NICU and see where life takes her!

December Commencement - Class of 2018



Student Success Center enjoys strong first year

The men behind the Student Success Center shared their expertise this academic year at conferences around the country. Dr. Casey Rentmeester attended Great Lakes Regional Student Success in Detroit, Michigan, in March where he met with other leaders in Student Success. Dr. Rentmeester is on the advisory board for this conference and presented one of 24 posters submitted.

While at the conference, he took away new ideas to implement in his own teaching and approach in the Student Success Center from other presenters and speakers at the conference.

When speaking to others about Bellin College's Student Success Center, he said people were "blown away by our numbers." Larger campuses sometimes didn't have the attendance numbers that Bellin College does.

Dr. Adam Sprague, Student Success Center coordinator, also in March attended the 2019 Contemplative Practices for Higher Education. While there, he presented a session on mindfulness. The session was titled "Mindfulness Interventions for Medical Students: One Student Success Centers Mission & Results."

During the session he detailed his research on mindfulness interventions and discussed the results of his study of 25 students. He led attendees through the same mindfulness experience used with his students.

The center has shown significant growth in its first year in operation. The difference in attendance between the first and second semesters of the academic year

was about 300 badge-in growth. Throughout the first year the center had more than 2,100 appointments and drop-ins for students during staffed hours. Of these visits, 16 percent of students visited nine or more times. In addition to attendance, the numbers of appointments booked online also grew semester over semester. These are imperfect statistics as drop-ins are only tracked when the center is staffed.

Last fall, the Development
Department ran a Giving Week
campaign to raise money to add
furniture and equipment to the
Student Success Center. Throughout Summer 2019, the space will be
transformed to add a collaboration
station, new furniture, technology,
power towers and to provide private study spaces as was noted as a
desire on student surveys.

The chosen scenario for the drill was a tornado hit the atrium of the college. Volunteer "victims" were triaged and transported to medical care rooms where emergency services were provided. The disaster simulation has become a highly anticipated annual event and provides a unique opportunity for interdisciplinary collaboration and development, as well as enhancing clinical judgment in an emergency situation.

Dr. Vera Dauffenbach retired from Bellin College in December 2018. Radiology alumni finds calling as physician assistant at Mayo Clinic

Casey Fazer was part of the first class to graduate from Bellin College with a bachelor's degree in radiologic sciences in 2013. After her time at Bellin College, she went on to receive her master's in Physician's Assistant Studies degree in 2015 from University of Wisconsin-Madison. She now works at the Mayo Clinic in Medical Oncology where she treats patients with head and neck cancers.

Casey knew she wanted to help others and, growing up, she wanted to be a teacher, but that plan shifted when her grandmother passed away from breast cancer.

"Being a physician assistant, I get the best of both worlds where I get to play a vital role in healthcare and be involved in teaching," she said. "I educate my patients and their families every day. Casey credits being in the hospital and clinical settings all four years at Bellin College as being paramount to her education. I have cried with patients when I have had to give them difficult news, but I also get to celebrate with patients when we have successfully treated their cancer."

"I pride myself in my work and see myself as a leader," she said. "I am involved in many committees throughout the division of Medical Oncology at Mayo Clinic.
